It should help us to decide that the means expended in travelling to the Conference could not be spent more profitable in any other way. The Lord calls you to come; He will meet with His people, and He longs to find YOU there. If at the present you cannot see your way clear, pray, 0 pray

most earnestly, that you may be able to attend. We may be sure that you will never be disappointed. We never did regret it in the past, and we will most certainly not now, when we are so much nearer to the end.

TRAVEL DIRECTIONS

The Conference site, "Mallo Camp", is located North-East of Newcastle, Wyoming, a short distance off from U.S. Highway No. 85. From Cheyenne, Wyoming, to Newcastle, Wyoming, is app. 250 miles over routes 87 and 20, and app. 250 miles over route 85.

Whether coming by car from the East, South, West, or North, go as far as Newcastle, Wyoming. From there proceed 18 miles North on U.S. Highway 85 to a place called "Four Corners" (a store, and the only main building there, owned by Mr. Pisciotti). Here at "Four Corners" make a right-hand turn (going East) and follow the signs, which point to "Mallo Camp".

Arriving at Newcastle, if needed, contact Bro. *P.E.Newell*, 351 E. Wentworth, on U.S.85 North, app. 3 city blocks off U.S. 16. His telephone number is, *SHerwood* 6-2464.

Those arriving by bus, have the choice of two "American Trailways", taking them as far as "Four Corners". A phone call to the camp will bring a car to pick them up. (The camp telephone number is not available at the moment). Inquire at the nearest Bus Depot about schedules to "Four Corners", Wyoming.

The "Burlington Railway" serves two trains a day to Newcastle. A bus meets the train to continue on to "Four Corners". Inquire for train schedules.

The closest airport is at Bellefouche, South Dakota. From there take bus South to "Four Corners", and call the camp.

WHAT TO BRING

Since the nights are rather chilly in the Wyoming Hills, bring as many blankets as possible to make you comfortably warm. This is highly important! Bring bedsheets, towels, and pillowcases. Make sure to bring your Bibles, lessons, note-books, song-books, musical instruments, and cameras. Prepare already today for special songs, poems, etc. Food and utensils will be provided for.

Above all, bring with you the heavenly angels, much of the Spirit of God, and a sunshiny disposition. All these will help to make the Conference a great success.

DELEGATES

Each church group appoint their delegates in ample time, and inform the Union Office at Denver about it.

PLEASE, REPORT YOUR COMING!

Every believer, who is planning to attend, should notify the Union Office at Denver as soon as possible. This is of the utmost importance, in order to make ample provisions for the accommodations of all. Everyone inform us also whether coming by car, bus, train, or otherwise. Revival, Reformation, Latter Rain

he latter rain experience can come to those only who have experienced a genuine reformation of life. And a reformation of life can come to those only who experience a deep spiritual revival.

In the second chapter of Joel the Lord calls for a revival and a reformation, and promises to give the latter rain to those who make an acceptable response to His call. In the prophecy of Zechariah the Lord says:

"Turn you to the stronghold, ye prisoners of hope: even today do I declare that I will render double unto thee. ... And the Lord their God shall save them in that day as the flock of His people: for they shall be as the stones of a crown, lifted up as an ensign upon His land. For how great is His goodness, and how great is His beauty! ... Ask ye of the Lord rain in the time of the latter rain; so the Lord shall make bright clouds, and give them showers of rain, to every one grass in the field." Zech. 9: 12-17; 10: 1.

"Come and let us return unto the Lord, for He hath torn, and He will heal us; for He hath smitten, and will bind us up. ... Then shall we know, if we follow on to know the Lord: His going forth is prepared as the morning; and He shall come unto us as the rain, as the latter and the former rain unto the earth." Hosea 6:1-3.

The prophet Hosea says:

Here the condition is described upon which the latter rain is to be received. It is to return unto the Lord, that we be healed, and that we follow on to know the Lord more fully.

In the messages of the Spirit of prophecy a great abundance of definite counsel is given us regarding the spiritual revival and the reformation of life which the people of God must experience to prepare them to receive the fulness of the latter rain. Here is a most important statement:

"The latter rain, ripening earth's harvest, represents the spiritual grace that prepares the church for the coming of the Son of man. But unless the former rain has fallen, there will be no life; the green blade will not spring up. Unless the early showers have done their work, the latter rain can bring no seed to perfection. There is to be 'first the blade,

and then the ear, after that the full corn in the ear.' There must be a constant development of Christian virtue, a constant advancement in Christian experience. This we should seek with intensity of desire, that we may adorn the doctrine of Christ our Saviour. ...

"The heart must be emptied of every defilement, and cleansed for the indwelling of the Spirit. It was by the confession and forsaking of sin, by earnest prayer and consecration of themselves to God, that the early disciples prepared for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost. The same work, only in greater degree, must be done now." -Review and Herald, March 2, 1897.

"I saw that many were neglecting the preparation so needful, and were looking to the time of 'refreshing' and the 'latter rain' to fit them to stand in the day of the Lord, and to live in His sight. Oh, how many I saw in the time of trouble without a shelter! They had neglected the needful preparation, therefore they could not receive the refreshing that all must have to live in the sight of a holy God...

"I saw that none could share the 'refreshing', unless they obtain the victory over every besetment, over pride, selfishness, love of the world, and over every wrong word and action. We should, therefore, be drawing nearer and nearer to the Lord, and be earnestly seeking that preparation necessary to enable us to stand in the battle of the day of the Lord. Let us all remember that God is holy, and that none but holy beings can ever dwell in His presence." Early Writings, page 71.

The "needful preparation" emphasized in this statement is evidently the "spiritual revival and spiritual reformation" called for so earnestly in later messages. In one of the early testimonies we find the following statement:

"Those who come up to every point, and stand every test, and overcome, be the price what it may, have heeded the counsel of the True Witness, and they will receive the latter rain, and thus be fitted for translation." -Testimonies, Vol. 1, pp. 187, 188.

All these statements in the messages from the Spirit of prophecy are in full accord with the statements of the Scriptures, but they present the matter more in detail and in the common language of our time. The way is made so plain that none need err. And a truly joyous experience awaits the people of God when they receive the showers of the latter rain, as it says:

"I heard those clothed with the armor speak forth the truth with great power. It had effect. Many had been bound; some wives by their husbands, and some children by their parents. The honest who had been prevented from hearing the truth now eagerly laid hold upon it. All fear of their relatives was gnne, and the truth alone was exalted to them. They had been hungering and thirsting for the truth; it was dearer and more precious than life. I asked what had made this great change. An angel answered, 'It is the latter rain, the refreshing from the presence of the Lord, the loud cry of the third angel.'" -Early Writings. page 271.

In view of such a visitation from the Lord, how earnestly we should make the "needful preparation" for its reception.

CHURCH AND WORLD

CHRISTIAN men ought so to live that it were idle to speak of a comparison between them and the men of the world. It should not be a comparison, but a contrast. No scale of degrees should be possible: the believer should be a direct and manifest contradiction to the unregenerate. The life of a saint should be altogether above, and out of the same list as the life of a sinner. We should compel our critics not to confess that moralists are good, and Christians a little better; but while the world is darkness, we should manifestly be light; and while the world lieth in the Wicked One, we should most evidently be of God, and overcome the temptations of that Wicked One. Wide as the poles asunder, are life and death, light and darkness, purity and sin. There should be as much difference between the worldling and the Christian, as between hell and heaven, between destruction and eternal life. As we hope at last that there shall be a great gulf separating us from the doom of the impenitent, there should be here a deep and wide gulf between us and the ungodly. The purity of our character should be such, that men must take knowledge of us that we are of another and superior race. If we were what we profess to be, there would be no difficulty in detecting the Christian from the worldling. But alas! the church is so much adulterated, that we have to abate our glorying, and cannot exalt our character as we would. O for the time when "our conversation shall be in heaven," and the ignoble life of the worldly man shall be rebuked by our Christ-like character! God grant us more and more to be clearly a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a peculiar people; that we may show forth the praises of Him who has called us out of darkness into His marvelous light. Spurgeon.

The Weightier Matters of the Law

AN EXPOSITION OF MATTHEW 23:23.

EDITORIAL

SPIRITUAL SOUNDNESS

"Wherefore rebuke them sharply, that they may be sound in the faith." Titus 1:13.

The world is filled with poor mortals whose thoughts are more or less unbalanced, and whose imaginations are sickened as a result of sinful living or environments. Whether these traits are inherited or self-inflicted, the gospel of Christ holds hope for even these poor mortals. As the demoniacs, after their miraculous deliverance, sat peacefully at the feet of their deliverer Jesus, so every sin-sick soul today may rest peacefully in the loving arms of the Master.

But there are milder forms of thought-derangements in multitudes of people today, which are actually more serious than may be anticipated, because they are harder to detect and often not visible to the human eye. Since these cases are not only wide-spread in the world at large, but are found in religious circles as well, it is time that we study into the effects of them, for the benefit of all concerned.

As the beauty and symmetry of creation has greatly deteriorated through sinful living, so has also the power of balanced thinking been crippled in a large measure. A healthy body, in which every organ works harmoniously, usually is well-balanced. As a result we may expect a sunshiny disposition, happiness and contentment. A sickened physical condition predisposes the mind to gloominess and pessimistic views. In such a case there may be no actual reason for despondency, yet through the disarrangements of the body functions the accumulated waste matter in the system may cast a cloak-like darkness upon the mind and may render the victim completely blind to sober thinking. This alone proves the great benefit of healthful living beyond argument.

ONE-SIDEDNESS

There was a class of individuals in Christ's day whose minds, for some reason, had become deranged to a fearful degree. Their thoughts had developed into just one direction, to the neglect of every other faculty. Of them the Master declared,

"Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! for ye pay tithe of mint and anise and cummin, and have omitted the weightier matters of the law, judgment, mercy, and faith..."
Matthew 23:23.

This is a typical example of unsound and unbalanced thinking. Christ did not stamp them as woe-ful hypocrites because they paid tithe, and that to the minutest detail - for this is a biblical arrangement of divine origin beyond dispute. He reprimanded them rather for their one-sided attitude and their overstressing of much smaller matters, to the neglect of more important issues. He was astonished at their lack of eye-sight concerning the love of God, as expressed in judgment; mercy and faith. He continues His sorrowful record by stating. "Ye blind guides, which strain at a gnat, and swallow a camel." Verse 24. What a pitiful condition to be in! A small insect, known for its annoyance, may be an evil thing in itself, yet it is of all things of little harm. And yet, how many are all wrought up over supposed wrongs committed by others, while they themselves harbor wicked thoughts of a hundred-fold larger magnitude in their hearts. It is like watching for the enemy at the front door, while he is entering in the rear already.

The story of the woman, taken in adultery, is a vivid presentation of this point. Indeed, this woman was taken while committing a serious offense, worthy of stern measures, - yet the very ones who were bent on her execution were steeped in much greater sins, even though it was hidden from human sight. They brought her to Jesus to tempt Him whether He would abide by the law or not. But Jesus read their innermost soul, as is lined out in Desire of Ages, page 461:

"These would-be guardians of justice had themselves led their victim into sin, that they might lay a snare for Jesus. Giving no sign that He had heard their question, He stooped, and fixing His eyes upon the ground, began to write in the dust.

Impatient at His delay and apparent indifference, the accusers drew nearer, urging the matter upon His attention. But as their eyes, following those of Jesus, fell upon the pavement at His feet, their countenances changed. There,

traced before them, were the guilty secrets of their own lives. ... Now rising, and fixing His eyes upon the plotting elders, Jesus said, 'He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her'."

Again listen at the familiar words of Jesus on the mountain, "And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye?" Matthew 7:3.

The spirit of judging others is a thought-derangement of no small degree. Either it is being done with the thought in mind that one's own sins are hidden from view, and therefore of no account, or else there is actual blindness toward one's own shortcomings. In either case it shows that the thoughts are completely unbalanced and are tending to injustice toward others. How dangerous such an attitude is in the life of a Christian, is shown in the following testimony:

"The effort to earn salvation by one's own works, inevitably leads men to pile up human exactions as a barrier against sin. For, seeing that they fail to keep the law, they will devise rules and regulations of their own to force themselves to obey. All this turns the mind away from God to self. His love dies out of the heart, and with it perishes love for their fellow-men. A system of human invention, with its multitudinous exactions, will lead its advocates to judge all who come short of the prescribed human standard."...

"He who is guilty of wrong, is the first to suspect wrong. By condemning another he is trying to conceal or excuse the evil of his own heart...

When men indulge this accusing spirit, they are not satisfied with pointing out what they suppose to be a defect in their brother. If milder means fail of making him do what they think ought to be done, they will resort to compulsion. Just as far as lies in their power, they will force men to comply with their ideas of what is right." -Mount of Blessing, pp.177, 178, 181, 182.

SELF-SEEKING

The position of the Pharisees in Christ's day is clearly defined by the words of the Master, saying,

"But all their works they do for to be seen of men." Matthew 23:5.

To be seen of men? What wrong is in this? Did not Jesus Himself say, "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, .. "? (Matthew 5:16) Did Jesus contradict Himself? Indeed not! Yet, why did He find fault with the Pharisees? The second part of His statement adds a very important thought, which, on purpose, is left out in the foregoing quotation to show the difference. It reads completely as follows, "Let your light so snine before men, that they may see your good works. and glorify your Father which is in heaven." This latter part of the verse the Pharisees did not comprehend. They did their good deeds with just one object in view: to gain the confidence of others, so they would support them in their selfish pursuits. We may compare it with the overly-sweet smile of a scheming sales-man, who will even make little presents wherever he goes, in order that he may be able to peddle his cheap merchandise at a high rate of profit. Everything in the life of the Pharisee circles around his own dear self. Anything that will draw the attention of the crowds and fasten it on the person of the Pharisee is welcomed as of utmost importance. Nothing is too holy to accomplish this end. So the Lord speaks of their wide fringes upon their garments, their seeking of the most distinguished seats at the table and in the synagogue, and their great delight in being addressed as Rabbi, Master, and Father (equivalent with Reverend today. Read Matthew 23:1-12). All this left God out and conferred all glory upon the poor, mortal agent. No wonder Jesus pronounced a woe upon this class of people.

MODERN PHARISEES

God's professed people of today turn with disgust from the name "Pharisee", for it carries an evil stigma and an ill savour. Yet many, even among so-called Reformers follow, unwittingly perhaps, in the steps of these hypocrites of former days. It is a solemn statement to make, nevertheless it is true and an established fact, that under the name of "Reform" a multitude of evil things may be covered up. Unbalanced minds, not fully out for the glory of God, but to foster their own petty ideas and inventions, and advertising their own persons, have made mountains out of mole-hills. They are overstressing theories of smaller importance, but are strangely neglectful on vital questions pertaining to the divine law and eternal life.

In Luther's day, not content with the marvelous results of the reformation, some erratics began to tear the pictures off the walls, claiming that they were a transgression of the second commandment, which they were not. Others again, not content with the teaching of the freedom we enjoy in Christ by having our sins pardoned, began to revolt against their masters, in a mistaken idea of liberty. These influences have not died as yet, for we see them, and others of the same nature, still advocated by some unbalanced individuals.

In Gospel Workers, page 313, the Servant of God relates her own experiences with this class of people:

"In time past there have been presented to me for my opinion many non-essential, fanciful theories. Some have advocated the theory that believers should pray with their eyes open. Others teach that, because those who ministered anciently in sacred office were required, upon entering the sanctuary, to remove their sandals and wash their feet, believers now should remove their shoes when entering the house of worship. Still others refer to the sixth commandment, and declare that even the insects that torment human beings should not be killed. And some have put forth the theory that the redeemed will not have gray hair - as if this were a matter of any importance.

I am instructed to say that these theories are the production of minds unlearned in the first principles of the gospel. .. Let not our ministers spend time in the discussion of such matters."

HEALTH-REFORM,

as important as it is in being the right arm of the message and an entering wedge for our work, has produced many unbalanced zealots, not being satisfied with the exhaustive instructions of the Spirit of prophecy. They take for granted the views of so-called health-instructors (some of whom even advocate the eating of some meat), and not of our faith. To these mistaken healthreformers the following words are addressed:

"But when men who advocate reform carry matters to extremes, and are inconsistent in their course of action, people are not to blame if they do become disgusted with the health reform. These extremists do more injury in a few months than they can undo in their whole lives. By them the entire theory of our faith is brought into disrepute, and they can never bring those who witness such exhibitions of so-called health reform to think that there is anything good in it. These men are doing a work which Satan loves to see go on." -Testimonies, Vol. 2, page 377.

Let us fling high the standard of health reform in every particular, but let us remain well balanced and sober thinking, not accepting every new view presented, unless proven by the Spirit of prophecy. Sad to say that this class of one-sided reformers among Adventists have often shown a marked indifference toward the "weightier matters of the law", namely concerning the downtrodden law of God in the wars of 1914 and 1939, when the Advent people contradicted their own teaching by combatant fighting in the European armies.

Jesus pointed to the Pharisees as making the "outside of the cup and of the platter clean". Yes, we also wash our dishes for health reasons and for cleanliness. But the Pharisees left them within "full of extortion and excess". Matthew 23:25.) If health reform is so one-sided that it does not reform the heart as well, but leaves temper, anger, rudeness, moodiness, self-centeredness unopposed, what good can be derived from such an unbalanced belief? Balance it out with the sweetness of Jesus's love and forbearance, and it will become a mighty power for good in this world.

As with health reform, so with every other phase of the message. Any part of it which does not make the love and forbearance of God paramount in its teaching, is unbalanced and unfit to be presented. To hold on with a dogmatic grip to small advanced parts of the message, and then judging all others who do not come up to that supposed standard, is in God's sight a much greater sin than coming somewhat short of the mark in weakness. Better than both is to live the truth in all its phases, yes, even to all fine points of perfection, with a deep love for God and our fellow men in our hearts. This is the ultimate, triumphant state of God's people. Shall we pray and work toward it?

"God's remnant people, standing before the world as reformers, are to show that the law of God is the foundation of all enduring reform..."

Prophets and Kings, page 678.

The "weightier matters of the law" are the fruits of the Spirit, "love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance." Gal. 5:22. Nevertheless there is a dead law which deals with cold paragraphs and letters, and which condemns by outside appearance alone. The "law of the Spirit" pours sweet love into the dead forms of the law, and graces it with longsuffering and understanding, giving considerations to circumstances involved. It never condemns, but brings the repentant sinner to the cross of Calvary. These are the "weightier matters of the law", as written upon the tables of our hearts.

We believe, dear brethren and sisters, truly, that it is God who at this time is doing His work "Not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord of hosts." Zech. 4:6. "He will accomplish His work gloriously". (Early Writings, page 70.) God Himself has promised to "recover" the remnant of Israel "the second time". (Isa. 11:11.)


